February Outing 2023 Jailbreak Cruise 5th - 12th March

After weeks of analysing depths and best plans of attack there was, after all, no Get Out of Jail Free card for those wishing to sail to Pittwater this year.

With no possibility of any keel boats departing the lake the decision was made to condense the planned two week cruise into one and enjoy an intense week on the lake!

Day 1 kicked off at the delightful anchorage in Kilaben Bay with crews going ashore to share an extended happy hour and BBQ in the beautiful Kilaben Bay Reserve.

The depth of friendship was evident as the crews from *The* Bach, Double Fun, 2 Dream, Isla Breeze, Stoked, Windsong, Seriousleigh, Irish Mist II, Osprey, Moondance, Migaloo, Reverie and Chandon gathered - all delighted to catch up in this lovely setting.

MINUTES IN THE CD SPOTLIGHT.... continuing the adventure!

Q3. There're many in the Division who fondly recall times spent aboard 'Warialda' - what other boats have you owned?



After *Bluebird* I had another VS *Rendezvous* which I built, a bit rough but a lot lighter and faster, and I introduced a couple of innovations that actually worked.

In the July 2022 #388 edition of CruiseLetter, Graeme and Sue Bishop contributed an article **Mapping the Lake** detailing the first known mapping (Charting ?) of the Lake by Capt. Ernest Snowden Deed the jig builders father.





After this I hit the pause button and from the time I was 23 (1951) until I was 43 (1971) I worked 7 days a week and during this time I married, started a family and then a business. It was hard going at times. I went for the odd sail, but this proved very unpopular at home. In 1966 as the family were getting big enough to have a boat, I bought them a Heron dinghy and trailer. We trailed it with us on annual holidays, including to the Tuggerah Lakes and Port Stephens.

In 1969 whilst still working 7 days a week the opportunity arose to fund the purchase of a yacht. I couldn't resist, probably never tried. I bought a well-equipped GRP Top Hat with a confronting Vire 2 stroke engine. The boat was named *Astor-iti* and had been built for Peter Warner by Geoff Baker in 1965 as a JOG racer, with sail number 88. Peter was the son of Sir Arthur and the Warner family were big in manufacturing and owned the magnificent stays'l schooner *Astor*. *Astor* (nee Ada 1924) gained line honours in 3 early Sydney-Hobart races, and I believe *Astoriti* was Little Astor in Tahitian.

It was ordained that Peter Warner would enter the family business but whilst they tried, every time they caught and caged him, he escaped away to sea. He achieved international prominence in 1966 when commercial fishing in Tongan waters, an archipelago of 170 islands, many of which are uninhabited. Passing one of these islands he knew to be uninhabited he noticed a wisp of smoke. Landing to investigate he found 6 teenage Tongans who had been there for 18 months and presumed dead. A real-life Lord of the Flies! Sadly last year (2021) a rogue wave washed Peter from the deck of a yacht off Ballina. He was 90 years old. Despite the moment of her name, I renamed *Astor-iti* to *Vigil* to reflect my long, lonely wait.

Shortly after I bought the Top Hat, I bought a new GRP Sabot — which was a great hit with the family. If it wasn't being towed it was on roof racks, we called it *Vigil-Ant*.

In *Vigil* we cruised to Wisemans Ferry and twice to the Myalls, once to Bulahdelah and Bungwahl and once in a Club Cruise.

By 1973 I couldn't stand the Vire engine any longer. Another club member, who like all the others knew about the engine made an offer telling me "If its mechanical, it can be fixed".

I considered his offer and ordered a new Currawong 30 with a Volvo Diesel!

This boat named *Legend* was and always will be my favourite and was also built by Geoff Baker.

Some 8 or 9 months later the new owner of *Vigil* (now *Saracen*) came up to me in the bar and told me he had fixed the problem. How, I asked? His response I put a Yanmar diesel in!

Again my thanks to Ray for this wonderful reflection on his long association with sailing. Looking forward to even more memories next month!



Those participating in the Jail Break Cruise were treated to a week of absolutely magnificent sunsets. From the scarlet skies over Kilaben Bay (courtesy no doubt to the fires in western NSW) to burnt orange vistas in Browns Bay, to the gentle pastels over Kooroora Bay on the final night. We really are privileged to live in this beautiful place!

Handy Hint ...

Those who recently participated in the Lake Cruise would no doubt endorse the time and effort it takes to wash the sticky mud from the anchor and chain.

Whether you employ either deck wash or bucket the prime objective is to avoid water and mud in the anchor locker.

Whilst most modern yachts come with a raised platform to keep the anchor and chain above any water that gets in and sloshes around, those without can keep their chain dry by inserting a shelf made from an old milk crate cut down to size — works a treat!
