The channel dredging was finally completed the week before Christmas (a great present for all members with deep drafted yachts). So we are now (hopefully) cleared for our first voyage to Pittwater in 3 years.

It's important to remember that we need a PERMANENT solution to the channel silting problem, and we need to maintain the pressure on the politicians and government officials. Please contact the minister for transport using the following link <u>https://www.nsw.gov.au/nsw-government/ministers/minister-for-transport</u>. Emphasise the need to permanently keep the channel navigable. Copy to your local member and me so that I have a record. We are receiving encouraging news that a long term plan is being implemented.

Feedback from members attending the new format of the Christmas party was very positive. Members enjoyed the informal atmosphere that allowed more social interaction and the added comfort of air conditioning of the main Bayview club area. The food platters were satisfactory, but we will work to improve this for next year. I hope you all enjoyed the Christmas Party and I welcome any suggestions to improve the event.

PITTWATER CRUISE 2024 Pre-Cruise Preparation



At a General Meeting a few years ago there was a discussion regarding the tricky business of provisioning for a long cruise. Whilst the Pittwater Cruise only runs for a couple of weeks the ideas below may be of interest. Below is a short summary of items discussed by the panel with 'added extras' supplied by members at the meeting.

1. Shopping List - Draw up a comprehensive list of the food <u>vou</u> like to eat then head off to the shops!

- Tinned food (fruit, vegetables, soups, sauces) / pre packaged food (Tacos, Burritos etc) / dried foods (peas) / frozen foods (vegetables, fish portions, meats) / foods with long shelf life (LL milk /cream / custard)
- Space Savers sauces for stir fry mixes / chilli con carne / spag bol saves packing lots of, ingredients such as herbs, spices
- Fresh purchase at the last minute unless you intend cooking / freezing
- Don't forget eggs perfectly packaged to last for weeks without refrigeration just find a secure storage spot and remember to rotate the eggs about once per week to maintain freshness

Emergency meals - nothing wrong with a tin of Baked Beans when the chips are down!

NB - The meaning of 'Use By' and 'Best Before' dates -

Food marked as **'Use By'** must be consumed by the date shown otherwise there is a risk of the food being spoilt and if eaten possibly causing illness. Foods marked as **'Best Before'** will still be quite safe to consume after the shown date but possibly be less palatable having been kept past their best by date.

2. Cooking extravaganza

- Cook up meals that can be quickly thawed, heated and bulked out by adding to dried food such as pasta / rice (curry/spaghetti bol sauce / stews / soups / meat balls casseroles ..)
- Cook freeze and cryovac. When packing divide up into small portions e.g. serves for two to prevent waste. These smaller packages also save room in the fridge (shorter cruise) or the freezer (for a longer cruise).
- If you have a freezer but no cryovac machine try freezing foods in clean 1 litre milk cartons. Compact, cheap, easy to pack and disposable after use.

3. Alternatives

- Look for alternatives e.g. instead of bread-use Wraps / Vita Weets / Saos / Corn Thins etc
- When fresh meat is running low and the fish refuse to bite tinned salmon/tuna is a great stand by for either salads, patties or mornays
- Look for healthy snack alternatives nuts / dried fruit / trail mix etc take up less room than chips and muesli bars and better for you!
- Living food herbs / sprouts last well under the dodger don't forget to water regularly! Good alternative to lettuce .

Fresh Food

Always the dilemma! How to preserve?

Fruit - apples, pears, oranges - wrap in tissue paper - keeps skin dry and prevents mould.

Even carrots, onion and potatoes last longer if kept separate and dry.

Try using butchers paper to separate the layers.

Finding the best dry storage spot on board for vegetables is vital - just don't forget they're there when you get back home!

Bread - some say wrapping in Alfoil will extend shelf life - best kept in fridge if there's room. Keep Fresh bags - these work! You'll find them in major supermarkets near the clingwrap and alfoil.

It is also important to have enough food for those times when weather conditions prevent your passage to the next port. Always ensure the pantry has a healthy supply of tinned/dried food which can be easily converted (with a bit of imagination) to a wholesome meal.


Thinking ahead to our up-coming Pittwater Cruise — at the end of the day when cruising with friends there's very little worry of ever going hungry!!

back out on the ocean to enjoy some coastal cruising as well!



Handy Hint

Over the New Years weekend we took the boat down to the southern end of the lake to explore some places seldom visited and dropped anchor for the night in Barden's Bay just adjacent to Trinity Point.

Protected from most breezes and blissfully quiet it was good to be tucked away from the maddening crowd and watch the comings and goings at Trinity Pt Marina.

Come morning light it was time to weigh anchor but lo and behold we found ourselves firmly attached to something very heavy on the bottom!

As luck would have it we had not inadvertently picked up a submarine cable as feared but the chain had obviously wound itself around an abandoned mooring block. As we discussed the best course of action Stoked slowly drifted forward and graciously unwound herself and off we went! Discussion followed as to what to do in the case of a snagged cable?

One possible solution is to swim down the chain (hanging on in water where visibility is poor) and

pass a rope under the already lifted cable back to the boat. Once this is done the anchor can be lowered and gently removed from under the cable and the rope released thus allowing the cable to rest back on the bottom.
