### AN UPDATE FROM SAILING COMMITTEE



The end the 2023/24 season ended in seasonal light conditions with some close and exciting racing. Congratulation to all of the podium boats and thanks to all skippers and crew for another enjoyable season of racing at LMYC. In all Divisions the Annual Pointscore was very close and came down to the last few races.

As the current season closes, the Sailing Committee now turns its attention to getting feedback from our skippers and crew and planning for the upcoming 2024/25 season.

We also discussed the upcoming Boat Owners, Skippers and Crew Survey. While much of the survey is the same as previous years there were some areas we would like to explore including:

- Why we have seen a drop off in fleets in the last few months.
- With the Swansea Channel now dredged, what interest is there in offshore racing.
- What support is there for moving from four Division to two Divisions on Saturdays.
  - Division 1 would include all current Division 1 boats, most of the current Division 2 boats and some Division 3 boats.
  - While Division 2 would include some of the smaller boats in Division 2 and 3 and all of the current Division 4 boats.
  - Division 1 would do the current Division 2/3 courses and Division 2 would do the current Division 4 courses.



We will send out the survey in early April and then have a follow up meeting in early May (Date TBC). ## RKR ROBERTSON MEMORIAL TROPHY



KEL ROBINSON, 1946

The RK Robertson series of inter-club races was first sailed in the 1977-78 season and was sailed in 4 divisions 1,2,3 and an open division. The results would suggest the standard of sailing at RMYC was far higher than the other clubs, or perhaps the handicappers got it wrong!

The results for the 1977-78 and first RK Robertson were.

But who was RK Robertson?

Prime mover to create a race in the memory of RK (Kel) Robertson was Ralph Cummings who had been a great mate of Kels and a great mate to him. Both Ralph and Kel lived close to each other in Merewether but Kel never owned a car and was reliant on Ralph for transport to Belmont. At other times one can readily imagine how hard and time consuming it would be to service a yacht on a mooring in Belmont from so far away as Merewether using firstly a tram, then a bus or train then walking the rest of the way to the club, perhaps carrying heaps of gear.

In the 1976-77 season Ralph was a member of the LMYC Board and Club-Captain and mooted the idea of a trophy in Kel's memory. This was taken up and expanded to include other clubs sailing on the Lake. Meetings were held at Toronto and Belmont with representatives from Wangi ASC, RMYC, Croudace Bay SC and LMYC attending. The concept was readily accepted and venues, hosting, number of races etc. was agreed on.

It was hoped that after each race competitors would stay at the host club to socialize before returning to their respective clubs. This was only partially successful for a number of reasons. A suggestion that the last race of the series finish at a neutral venue for a barby and beer was not pursued.

Kel was not a Founding Father of LMYC but was an early boat owner. In 1938 Les and Barry Steel built a Tumlaren Class yacht for him and it was launched in the December of that year. It cost about £350 (S700) plus £36 (S72) for main, jib, genoa and spinnaker and was named "Kyuma". It has been restored and then moored in the Dora Creek area and was displayed at the Wooden Boat Show at Toronto.

Kel was a gentleman and held in high respect by his fellow members but his contribution to LMYC was mainly as a participant although he did serve as Rear-commodore in 1945-46 and 46-47.


Kel married in 1947 and rather late in life. It is obvious he was held in high esteem by both management and members as it was decided that a dinner be held in his honour and the cost borne by the Club and furthermore "a suitable wedding present be presented to him at the dinner". The suitable present was a cheque for Ten Guineas which in to-days terms would be eight hundred to a thousand dollars.

This was the first and last time such an honour has been bestowed on a member of LMYC. Kel was elected Commodore for the 1947-48 year but was opposed after only one term and defeated. At the AGM the incoming Commodore's first duty was to call for a vote of thanks to the retiring Commodore, and as it had been a successful year it was easy to be sincere in recalling the merits of Kel's year as Commodore. In reply he let loose a barrage of accusations.

If said Kel, if I was such a good bloke, if I produced such a good financial return etc. why did you hypocritical bastards vote me out? Why indeed? After threatening to start a new yacht club at Marmong Point, Kel did a Billy Hughes and stormed out calling on those interested to follow. There were none!

After a few months he returned and in 1958 was made a Life Member.

Kel worked as a fitter and turner at the Railway Workshops at Cardiff, travelling to work each day by tram and train. One of his apprentices was a serious young man by the name of Bob Miller, who later changed his name to Ben Lexcen and became a household name as the designer of "Australia II" winner of the Americas Cup in 1983.



Kel was made a trustee of LMYC in 1946, had a dinner in his honour in 1947, elected Commodore in 1947, deposed as Commodore in 1948, elected a Life Member in 1958 and is the only member to have a series of races named to honour his memory.

Whilst Kel's contribution cannot be denied the RK Robertson Memorial Trophy owes more to the efforts of his mate Ralph Cummings than his own.
